

SNOOPER'S WIFE EXPELLED FOR ROW IN COURT

A prohibition snooper is justified in making whoopee and raising a commotion in a night club when he is gathering evidence against the owners, for isn't Uncle Sam paying the checks? Sir Snoop may even take his wife. Who cares?

But his wife mustn't confuse a night club with Traffic court, nor must she confuse a "stop" signal with a "go" signal, even if she is charged with driving while intoxicated and with making bumpee into the car of another citizen.

Mrs. Adele J. Tierney, a determined looking woman of 23, of 1710 Montgomery ave., Bronx, wife of a prohibition agent, got away last Monday with highhatting Magistrate August Dreyer in Manhattan Traffic court. She walked out on him while he was hearing a charge of reckless driving against her, sailing imperiously past the attendants.

Ordered Out of Court.

Yesterday she made such a racket that she had to be ordered out of court by the magistrate. Her protests were against an adjournment of her case to Jan. 8.

"You've deprived me of my license and I insist on having my trial go on so I can have it back," she shouted, banging her fist against the bench, under the startled nose of Magistrate Dreyer.

At an earlier hearing of the charge adjourned yesterday, Harry Dworetz, a real estate operator, of 257 Montgomery st., Brooklyn, the complaint, swore that Mrs. Tierney was intoxicated when she passed the stop signal at 48th st. and 5th ave., early Nov. 2, and crashed into his machine.

The summons given her at that time was returnable on Nov. 14, but she failed to appear and was finally brought in on a warrant.

Second Offender.

Besides the reckless driving charge against her there is a 42-mile an hour speeding complaint and records show her to be a second offender. She was given the summons for speeding on Nov. 28 at 87th st., and Central Park West.

Although escorted to court by a number of rough-looking men who were there to protect her from newspaper photographers, Mrs. Tierney's strong-looking countenance was snapped by a cameraman of the DAILY NEWS.

Raymond Welch, 24, of Red Bank, N. J., yesterday began serving a five-year sentence for manslaughter, imposed on him Wednesday by Judge Jacob Steinach at Freehold, N. J. He was found guilty of driving a car which caused the death of Grace Morris, 20, of Middletown.
